REV. Dr. Addie L. Wyatt (1924-2012)

The late Reverend Dr. Addie L. Wyatt was born on March 8, 1924 in Brookhaven, Mississippi. The oldest girl of eight children, at the age of three, she gave her first recitation in church. This began a career in public speaking and preaching, eclipsed only by a lifetime of work in which her actions spoke even louder than her powerful words. Her mission in life was to work for peace and justice.

Rev. Wyatt was one of the nation's foremost labor leaders. She was the first female local union president of the United Packinghouse Food and Allied Workers. She began with the Amalgamated Meat Cutters and Butcher Workmen of North America in 1941 and became the organization's first female international vice president. She and her husband, Dr. Claude Wyatt, Jr., founded the Wyatt Choral Ensemble in 1944. Rev. Wyatt was ordained in 1955, and the following year, the Wyatts began working closely with Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. They helped found Operation Breadbasket and served on the board of Operation PUSH.



Rev. Wyatt served as the director of the Women's Affairs and Human Rights departments of the Amalgamated Meat Cutters. Eleanor Roosevelt appointed her to serve on the Labor Legislation Committee of the Commission on the Status of Women, which presented its national report in 1963. In 1974, she helped found the Coalition of Labor Union Women. She was elected to the CBTU Executive Council and appointed the first chair of the CBTU Women's

committee. She was also a founding member of the National Organization for Women (NOW) and a leader in the struggle for an Equal Rights Amendment.

In 1976, She was named one of Time Magazine's Women of the Year and received a similar honor from The Ladies Home Journal in 1977. Ebony Magazine named her one of the 100 Most Influential Black Americans from 1980 to 1984.

Rev. Wyatt retired as co-pastor of Vernon Park Church of God in Chicago, a church she and her husband co-founded in 1984. She passed away March 28, 2012 in Chicago, Illinois.

DR. WILLIAM "BILL" LUCY

For more than four decades, Dr. William "Bill" Lucy has been involved in worker justice and international affairs, leaving a legacy as one of the most influential African Americans in the Labor movement. Dr. Lucy retired as the International Secretary-Treasurer of the 1.4 million-member American Federation of State, County, and Municipal Employees (AFSCME), AFL-CIO. He was first elected AFSCME Secretary-Treasurer in May 1972. He is founder and the president of the Coalition of Black Trade Unionists (CBTU), an organization of union leaders and rank-and-file members dedicated to the unique needs of African Americans and minority group workers.

Dr. Lucy is a former President of Local 1675, Contra Costa County Employees Association of Contra Costa County, California, where he was employed for 13 years. He joined the AFSCME International Staff in 1966 as the Associate Director of the Legislation and Community Affairs departments. He served as Executive Assistant to AFSCME's late president, Jerry Wurf.

Dr. Lucy is credited as creator of the "I Am A Man" mantra, the indelible and iconic message of the Memphis, Tennessee sanitation workers' strike.

One of the founders of the Free South Africa Movement that launched the successful anti-apartheid campaign in the United States in the mid-1980s, he led an AFL-CIO delegation to South Africa to monitor the first democratic election.

He serves as vice president of Public Services International, the world's largest union federation, and also serves on the boards of directors for the Africa-America Institute, Americans for Democratic Action and the Center for Policy Alternatives.

A native of Memphis, Tennessee, Dr. Lucy is a civil engineer by trade and attended the University of California at Berkeley. A participating member of boards of many national organizations, recipient of innumerable awards and honors, he received an honorary doctorate of Humanities from Howard University.


Rev. Quincy James Rineheart

I am a Black queer gay African American religious historian, theologian, activist, and teacher. I am pleased to serve as the Convener of the Bayard Rustin Society at Chicago Theological Seminary. My doctoral research on Rustin has allowed me to present at Harvard University, Oxford Symposium on Religion at the University Church of St. Mary the Virgin of Oxford, in Oxford, England, and Morehouse College.



I celebrate the life and witness of Bayard Rustin, a radical revolutionary, who was the lead strategist behind the historic 1963 March on Washington for Jobs and Freedom. Rustin also helped to transform many to become moral agents of social change in the world. For me, Rustin serves as an exemplar for young gay, Black males; that my existential reality has sacred worth.



I am a graduate of Wilberforce University with a Bachelor of Arts in Literature. I hold a Master of Divinity in Ethics and Theology with a certificate in Black Church Studies from Emory University and a Master of Sacred Theology in the Study of Ethics and Theology from Chicago Theological Seminary. Currently, I am a third-year Ph.D. student at Chicago Theological Seminary.



Doria Johnson

While working with the Samuel DeWitt Proctor Conference, Inc. (SDPC) staff, I helped create the SDPC Black Church Archival and Historical Marker Project where five hundred sites were identified as important to liberation efforts in the United States. I envisioned a public history event to mark the centennial of the lynching of my ancestor, Anthony Crawford, in Abbeville, South Carolina. We

partnered with the Equal Justice Initiative, and they funded and built the marker and soil collection for the National Lynching Museum, as well as a scholarship contest for local high school students. My family hosted a freedom school and collaborated with SDPC to host a sacred ceremony of remembrance, contrition, consecration and renewal, as we stood on the grounds of the lynching site to consecrate soil collected there.

I am a graduate of Roosevelt University with a Bachelors of Arts degree in History. I received a Master of Arts in Afro American Studies from the University of Wisconsin, Madison where I am currently a Ph.D. candidate in U.S. history.



Rev. Dr. Maurice Stinnett




Rev. Anthony Hollins (1965 – 2007)

The late Rev. Anthony Hollins joined the Samuel DeWitt Proctor Conference (SDPC) as a student intern from the Chicago Theological Seminary and a Wyatt-Lucy Fellow. Over a four-year period, he became senior project manager. His creative genius helped to shape every SDPC program and the resources provided to clergy, lay leaders and congregations

across the nation, including annual conferences, the National Katrina Justice Commission and Hearings, the establishment of the Greater New Orleans Clergy for Restorative Justice and the HIV/AIDS consultations

and liturgical resources.

REV. Dr. SAMUEL DEWITT PROCTOR (1921-1997)



The late Rev. Dr. Samuel DeWitt Proctor was Pastor Emeritus of the Abyssinian Baptist Church of New York City and Professor Emeritus at Rutgers University. Dr. Proctor was President of Virginia Union University, Richmond, VA and North Carolina A&T State University. He held administrative positions with the Peace Corps in Nigeria and Washington, DC and the National Council of Churches. He was Pastor-in-Residence for the Institute for Child Advocacy at Children's Defense Fund/ Haley Farm. He was awarded honorary doctorate degrees from more than 50 colleges and universities. Dr. Proctor was a prolific writer and preacher, authoring We Have This Ministry, How Shall They Hear, and Sermons from the Black Pulpit, among many other books and articles.



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
